GRADUATION HIGHLIGHT

After last year's event was postponed due to the pandemic, Alberta Bible College (ABC) hosted its annual graduation service in COVID-compliant style on April 25, 2021, at Bow Valley Christian Church (BVCC).

Sporting special edition ABC facemasks and practicing physical distancing, a limited number of ABC staff and faculty gathered in-person to honour the thirty-two graduates from the classes of 2020 and 2021 who completed their respective certificates, diplomas, and degrees. The event was live-streamed on ABC's YouTube channel (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=9Jeb8s6xrNM&t=4684s) to allow family, friends, and other ABC supporters to celebrate the occasion.

Christopher Cobbler, an alumnus of ABC and the associate pastor at BVCC, gave the graduation address. From the messianic text of Isaiah 11:1-9, he challenged graduates with God's historical habit of bringing life and hope out of seemingly dead stumps. "This text for me serves as a reminder that God still speaks in dark places," he encouraged. "I believe the ABC graduates are life springing up from dead places." He continued,

"Alberta Bible College graduates, you cannot allow your dreams of hope to die. There is a mission that God is inviting you into, and you, like Isaiah, must look beyond. You must look beyond your present circumstance. You must acknowledge the stump before you but simultaneously recognize God's supernatural ability to transform that stump, to transform lives, to transform families, relationships, to transform governments and polices, to transform the hearts of men and women everywhere. And so we wait eagerly for God's kingdom to come to earth as it is in heaven. We do not wait passively, as one watching the hours pass by. No, we wait actively, participating in a world that revokes the right to hurt and destroy as a means of possession, control, and mastery... Isaiah is inviting the ABC graduates into a proleptic stance," Cobbler urged, drawing on the prophet's vision of a new creation. "Into a vision in which a future event is so sure to come, so sure to be the case, that we begin speaking about it in the present tense."

SCHOLARSHIPS 2021–2022

This year several returning students applied for various Alberta Bible College scholarships for the upcoming academic year. To protect the names of our students, we are not publishing the award winners. However, we want to announce the following scholarships were granted for the upcoming 2021–2022 academic year:

Earl Bergman Scholarship (\$1500) was offered to a student consistently involved in the evangelistic ministry of a local congregation.

John and Lillian Bergman Scholarship (\$1500) was awarded to a promising student who demonstrated financial need, and throughout the course of the student's studies, has shown consistent interest and engagement in pastoral ministry, both in formal programming and/or informal initiative.

Boyd Lammiman Scholarship (\$1200) was given to a student doing or aspiring to do intercultural ministry.

Dorothy Chapman Scholarship (\$1200) went to a female student demonstrating commitment to children's or women's ministry.

Jim Chapman Preaching Scholarship (\$1200) was awarded to a student enrolled at Alberta Bible College who is actively preaching and ministering in an under-served congregation.

Edna Hunt Scholarship (\$1200) went to a returning student who demonstrates consistent interest and engagement among people of other cultures.

Gateway Youth Scholarship (\$1500) was offered to a student showing consistent interest in working with youth.

Summer Ministry Scholarship (20%, 40%, or 60% tuition discount, depending on year of education) has been offered to several ABC students who have an approved work/ministry plan and who will provide satisfactory evidence of leadership through the Summer Ministry component of Field Experience.

Centre Street Church Scholarship (specific amounts in partnership with ABC) was awarded to two students who attend CSC and are pursuing strategic ministry-based education at Alberta Bible College.

Church Matching Scholarship (ABC matches, up to \$1800, a church's investment in a student) has been accessed by several students who are sponsored by their local church and, in some cases, are currently serving in those churches.

We are happy to announce a new scholarship, the Bishop Arthur T. Harrison/Reverend Cyril D. Romeo Empowering Leaders Scholarship, honouring the church leaders here named for their faith service. This is a new scholarship which provides \$2600.00 annually for students from around Windsor, ON who are in a program of theological studies at ABC and who have demonstrated leadership and pastoral skills. MEET DAN HARDOCK

(Adjunct Professor)



Dan Hardock started teaching for ABC four years ago and has since become a regular adjunct. He recalls, "It was our former librarian, Darcy Gallagher, who introduced me to ABC when the college needed someone to teach the apologetics course. I had worked with Darcy before, and since I had developed the apologetics course when we worked together, I guess I came to his mind!"

One of Dan's first ministry jobs was working for an apologetics ministry. "Apologetics is kind of in my blood," Dan quips, "although I am aware that the subject has a bit of an image problem. My reaction is that if you conduct your intellectual interactions in a way that does not honour I Cor. 13, you should stop because you are doing more harm than good."

After working for the apologetics ministry for three years, Dan did a Masters of Christian Studies from Regent College. At the same time, he was part of a team successfully that planted a church in Port Coquitlam. "Studying theology while putting it into practice within the same week was a very cool experience." Dan added, "I have always argued that a person's intellectual and spiritual life should be seamless, and this experience gave me the opportunity to live that out in a very practical way."

Moving back to Calgary, Dan taught at Rocky
Mountain College for over 10 years specializing in
world history, church history, apologetics, as well as
teaching a variety of other classes. His favorite
memory is when he showed up in class in full Roman
armour and hustling the class out to teach them how
to do line warfare. "When it came to teaching my
class about the Roman Empire's army, I didn't tell
them about it. I drafted them into it!"

Dan also worked for Inter Varsity Christian Fellowship on the University of Calgary (UofC) campus, working with faculty and grad students. He also became Christian Medical and Dental Society's (CMDS) first Canadian staff worker based at the UofC medical campus. "The highlight of my CMDS work must be when I conducted a theology/spiritual formation course with a group of Sudanese physicians being upgraded by a joint project between the University of Calgary and Samaritan's Purse. I am very aware that most of those words are not normally associated with each other."

Dan's life has encountered tragedy. "I've held the hand and said goodbye to the person whom I thought I was going to become old and grey with. Because of cancer, I became a single father with two kids aged five years and the other 10 months. If it were not for the incredible support that was given to our family by our church community, I don't know where I would be today."

When asked about thoughts going into the future Dan replied, "I am very concerned with the degree to which conspiracy thinking has infected our churches, especially in the isolation brought about by the pandemic. Conspiracy thinking is probably one of the greatest impediments to outreach we have experienced in recent years because it makes us look inwards to a world of our own construction rather than outwards to the world where God's Spirit is at work. "

Dan is married to Christin and they have four kids aged 25 to 10. He is currently working on several writing projects.

DWELLING ON BEAUTY – A SURE COVID FATIGUE BUSTER!

At the beginning of May, the Calgary Herald sported the following headline: "People are rightfully gloomy." The author cited the survey completed by Maru Public Opinion that concluded Canadians are depressed right now. Sixty-six percent of respondents believed that "things will get worse before they get better" (Jesse Spencer, Calgary Herald, May 6, 2021). Though newest statistics seem to indicate a more positive picture in our battle with this virus, more than a year of hand-sanitizing, social restrictions, mask-wearing, and anxiety have left people tired—of COVID and of all that comes with it.

Suggestions for coping at this time abound. I would like to suggest one "tool in the toolbox" that helps me: dwelling upon that which is beautiful. Pardon? Is this not akin to the proverbial ostrich with its head in the sand? If you need a Scriptural encouragement to monitor your thinking, reflect upon what the Apostle Paul said in Philippians 4:8-9 (*The Message*):

Summing it all up, friends, I'd say you'll do best by filling your minds and meditating on things true, noble, reputable, authentic, compelling, gracious—the best, not the worst; the beautiful, not the ugly; things to praise, not things to curse. Put into practice what you learned from me, what you heard and saw and realized. Do that, and God, who makes everything work together, will work you into his most excellent harmonies. (Emphasis added)



What kinds of things are beautiful? In the spring, we don't have to look very far. Tree leaves are emerging, light green in their seasonal glory. Longer days. Chattering birds. The sun-dappled waves of the Bow River. If you're not an outdoor person, what about the beauty revealed in a story of someone giving of themselves for others? Or you may be nourished by a meaningful conversation with a neighbour.

The key word in that last sentence is *nourished*. If something feeds that which is best in you—fitting the criteria of Philippians 4—savour it. As you lie in bed at night, waiting for sleep to come and reflecting upon your day, meditate on those things—chew on them.

Going back to our passage from Philippians, Paul encourages believers to imitate him, to put into practice those things which build us up. Part of our rationale in doing this is because we are commanded to. Sensitive souls who struggle under the weight of the world may need to seize upon these instructions as "commands," as it can be hard for us to focus on beauty when there are so many burdens to carry. However, vital in our ability to focus on that which is beautiful, we understand God holds both the bigger picture, and our lives, in His careful, loving hands: "...God, who makes everything work together, will work you into his most excellent harmonies" (Philippians 4:9, *The Message*).

Phew! Now, out for a walk I go!
