## Students Return to ABC's Campus Following Peak of Omicron Wave

After beginning the first several weeks of the winter semester online due to the surging Omicron variant of COVID-19, Alberta Bible College welcomed students back to campus in February.

Some PACE courses resumed meeting in a hybrid (inperson/virtual) format beginning February 15, while most College classes resumed the hybrid format on February 28. Provincial public health measures and local bylaws also shifted on March 1, meaning that masks are now optional on ABC's campus. Physical distancing is also no longer required. Chapel in both the College and PACE programs will resume meeting in-person with no capacity limits.

As society learns how to live with COVID-19, ABC will be guided by our Communicable Disease Prevention Policy and Rapid Response Plan. While the pandemic has made it clear that the future is impossible to predict, we hope that the required responses to potential future waves of COVID-19 will be less disruptive to learning and community life. Whatever the future holds, however, we once again want to take the opportunity to thank the ABC community for their patience and grace as we seek to love and serve one another well in all seasons.

Amazingly, these weekly teachings of Scripture quickly grew to include people from all around the world. Now, as COVID-19 restrictions are being lifted globally and life is becoming busy again, the desire to dive deeper into God's Word is growing even more. "The origins of this [Re-Reading Scripture] were, how can we do something that might serve the church, particularly those that want to do a closer reading of Scripture? The end game is not a knowledge transfer; it's more about helping you become a more insightful reader yourself" (Dr. Stan Helton – ABC President).

# **ABC and Contributions to Scholarship**

We encourage our staff to stay engaged in the academics of their fields. Consequently, we get to hear about some of the study and research efforts of our staff team and want to keep our community apprised of these endeavours.

Marnie Hoetmer, one of our adjunct professors will be presenting at an event, jointly sponsored by the Canadian Church of Christ Historical Society and Alberta Bible College. Her presentation will be called "Disciples in Western Canada: People, Players, and Publishers," and the date is yet to be determined. Marnie is also the director of Youth Unlimited in Westlock, AB. She regularly teaches courses in biblical and Historical Theology, Christian Ethics, as well as others at ABC.

**David Ross**, while he is working for us, is also serving as a research assistant to Stephen Chester at Wycliffe College on the writing of the Oxford Bibliography (www.oxfordbibliographies.com/) for 1 Corinthians. See Chester, Stephen J. "First Corinthians." Oxford Bibliographies in "Biblical Studies," ed. Christopher R. Matthews (New York: Oxford University Press, forthcoming). We commend David for continuing his biblical studies that were fanned alive at ABC.

**Dr. Helton** has several projects coming together now. In addition to being added to the Board of Commissioners on the Commission for Accreditation of the Association of Higher Biblical Education (our accrediting body), his PhD dissertation has been submitted to Peeters, a publisher of scholarship in Belgium. It will be released as The "Text of Acts" in the Writings of Origen, Studia Patristica Supplements 9 (Leuven, Belgium: Peeters Publishers, 2022). Additionally, he has a couple of articles dealing with Stone-Campbell Restoration History: "Origen on the Meaning of Ψάλλειν in Codex Monacensis Graecus 314," Stone-Campbell Journal (forthcoming, 2022); and coming out in a few weeks, "The Text in Clement of Alexandria that Worried M. C. Kurfees," Restoration Quarterly 64, no. 2 (2022). Stan also has key academic presentations coming up: "Origen on Musical Instruments in Codex Monacensis Graecus 314," Burman University ΣΥΜΦΩΝΙΑ Conference, Lacombe, AB, Canada (March 16, 2022), as well as "Origen and the Endings of the Gospel of Mark" (Second Swiss National Sciences Foundation Mark16 Conference Online: The Transmission of Mark's Endings in Different Traditions and Languages, June 2–3, 2022).

**Shannon Gugyel** completed her Master of Arts Counselling Psychology degree from Yorkville University, Fredericton, NB. Two staff members, **David Ford** and **Kris Ford**, and one of our adjuncts, **Chad Hardy**, are completing PhDs at Trinity International University in Deerfield, IL. **David Ford** recently taught a four-week series on the Book of Revelation that was well-received at the Bow Valley Christian Church. He will soon teach an eight-week long class for the Edmonton Church of Christ on Restoration history beginning the week after Easter. **Kim Salcedo** continues to work on a Master's in Theological Studies from Wycliffe College, and **Tanya Woo**, a new adjunct professor and recent graduate of ABC, has almost completed her Master of Arts Counselling Psychology degree from Providence University College & Theological Seminary.

Staff at ABC persist in developing in their areas of academic and ministry interest. And, ultimately, God continues to help foster growth in others through the ongoing scholarship of those called to ABC to teach and impart knowledge in the name of Jesus, and for the kingdom's sake.
